

MARCH 31, 1818

State of Connecticut, County of Hartford

JOHN VIBBARD of East Hartford in Hartford County being duly sworn doth depose and say that he served in the Revolutionary War, on the Continental Establishment, and the Connecticut line for three years.

That he entered the service in the month of March 1777 to serve as a Private for three years and having faithfully served out his time, he received an Honorable Discharge dated at Quarters near Morristown 20th March 1780 and signed by Ebenezer Huntingdon Lt Col Commandant-- at which time he belonged to Lieut Hopkins Company and Col Sam'l B Webbs Regiment, Connecticut Line.

That he is a resident citizen of the United States, is in reduced circumstances, never had a pension, and is in need of assistance from his country for support.

AUGUST 1, 1820

State of Connecticut, County of Hartford

On this 1st day of August 1820, personally appeared in Open Court, the same Court being a Court of record for said County, having the power of fine and imprisonment, JOHN VIBBERT, aged 60---years, resident in the County of Hartford. (There is a line thru "Hartford") who, being duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary War, as follows: I entered in March 20, 1777 into Capt Charles Whitings company in Col Samuel Webbs Regt for the term of three years. Served my time out and I was honourably discharged. My original declaration was made on the 16th day of April 1818 and my pension certificate is No. 459.

I have a wife aged 43 years and her daughter Caroline aged 15 years, one daughter age 16 years and her child 2 months old to support. She is married to Chester Culver. Her name is Sophy. He has left her and child for me to support. One daughter Ruth aged 12 years. I am by occupation a farmer at which I am able to labor but part of my time.

Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act Of Congress making provision for Widows of Revolutionary Soldiers.

State of Connecticut; Hartford County; So. Glastenbury

On this 8th day of February 1939, personally appeared before me- David E Hubbard, one of the Judges of the County Court of and for the County of Hartford in the state aforesaid, at her own residence in Glastonbury

in said County and State, She being unable to appear before the Court in Hartford by reason of severe Reumatism(sic), Widow HANNAH VIBBARD (197) of said Glastenbury. A creditible person aged 57 years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on oath declare, That she is the surviving widow of JOHN VIBBARD (196), late of East Hartford who was a soldier of the United States Army, in the Revolutionary War; And who received a pension for his services therein, under the act of Congress of 1818. And who was afterward stricken from the Roll because he had a little property. For proof of his services she begs leave to refer to his Declaration and Proof, now in the pension office in Washington. He belonged to the Connecticut line and was placed on the pension roll May 11, 1818.

She further declares, that she was married to the said JOHN VIBBARD at East Hartford by Rev J M Fairchild then of that town on the 21 day of November, 1818.

And that she lived with him as his wife. Never again intermarried; All which will more fully appear by reference to the proof hereunto annexed.

FEBRUARY 9, 1838 (Trans 12/12/85-EV)

State of Connecticut, Hartford County So Glastonbury

On this 9th day of February 1838, personally appeared before the subscriber one of the Justices of the Peace for Hartford County, Leonard Jones a resident of said Glastonbury--- a credible person aged 36 years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on oath declare:

That is is well knowing to the fact that the Widow HANNAH VIBBARD, now a resident of So Glastonbury, is the widow of JOHN VIBBARD, late of E Hartford, County of Hartford, Conn; that he well remembers that she the said HANNAH was married to him the said JOHN VIBBARD in the month of November Eighteen Hundred Eighteen.

And is well knowing to the fact that she lived with him as his faithful wife from the time of their marraige until the 15th day of July A1831 when he the said JOHN VIBBARD died and she the before named HANNAH VIBBARD is still the widow of the above named JOHN VIBBARD.

Given at quarters near Morris Town 20 March 1780.

APRIL 14, 1838

HANNAH VIBBARD, widow of JOHN VIBBARD, who died on the 10th of July, 1831, of Hartford in the state of Conn. He was a private in the Company commanded by Captain J Mertins of the Regt cmd by Col Miller in the Connt. line for 2 years Conn.

Inscribed on the roll of Connt at the rate of \$80 dollars 00 cents, per annum to commence on the 4th day of March 1831 and terminating on the 15th July 1831. Certificate of Pension issued the 14 day of April 1838

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
