DECEMBER 26, 1832

State of New York, Saratoga County

On this 26th day of December 1832, personally appeared in open court, before the court of common pleas now sitting, TIMOTHY VIBBARD, a resident of the town of GALWAY in the county of Saratoga and state of NY, AGE 82 YEARS on the 20th DAY OF OCTOBER, One thousand eight hundred and thirty two, who being first duly sworn according to law, dost on his oath make the following deposition, in order to obtain the benefit of this act of Congress of June 7, 1832. That in the spring of 1775, thinks in the fore part of April, he enlisted for nine months and entered the service of the United States in a company commanded by Capt "Hezekiah _Banding" of Colonel Watermans Regiment of the New York State troops for nine months service, that he joined the said Company and Regiment at New Canaan in the County of Columbia and State of New York and marched with said company and regiment to Albany where said regiment was stationed there for three or four weeks, from there he marched with said regiment by the way of Half Moon, Stillwater & Saratoga to Fort George, at the head of Lake George, where he and said regiment arrived some few days after Colonel had taken Fort Ticonderoga, that he served nine months in said company & regiment at Albany, Fort George and Ticonderoga until he was discharged from the service. That in the spring of 1776 he entered the service of the United States by enlistment in a company of volunteers commanded by the aforesaid Captain Hezekiah Banding to his garrison at Fort Edward on the North river above Albany. He marched with said company from New Canaan aforesaid by the way of Albany, Half Moon & Stillwater to Fort Edward, and after having served as a soldier in said company at Ford Edward for about two and a half months, General Schuyler emancipated Fort Ticonderoga, and a part of General Schuylers troops came to Fort Edward where he with the aforesaid Company of Volunteers was discharged. At the time of service at Fort Edward as aforesaid, there was not any officers at Fort Edward until the arrival of General Schuylers troops from Fort Ticonderoga. on or about the 16th day of August 1777 he entered the service of the United States as a volunteer in a Company of Militia commanded by the aforesaid Capt Hezekiah Banding and marched with this company from New Canaan to Stillwater & Saratoga and was at the capturing of General Burgoyne, at which time he was in actual service (thinks)of two months. He has not documentary insurance of his service and that he knows of no person who can testify to his service other than the ones whose affidavit is hereunto annexed. The first campaign of nine months service he gives the name of Colonel Waterman. The second campaign of two and a months he gives the name of General Schuyler. There was no first officer at Fort Edward... till after the emancipation of Fort Ticonderoga by General Schuyler as aforesaid. He resided in the town of New Canaan in the county of Columbia and state of N Y when he entered the service of the United States as aforesaid and that he continued to live at New Canaan aforesaid until about forty three years since, when he moved into the State of Vermont and lived in the towns of of Wilmington & Bennington for a~out seven years. He then moved to Waterford in the County of Saratoga and State of N Y where he lived for about one year. He then moved to Ballston in said County of Saratoga, where he lived about six years. He then moved to Glenville in the County of Schenectady where he lived for about five Saratoga, where he lived for about six years and then moved into Galway where he has lived ever since. He was born in the town of Hartford in the County of Hartford and State of Connecticut on the 20th day of October 1750. He has a proof of his age which is in possession of his Son Reuben Vibbard of Edinburgh in the County of Saratoga. He was a volunteer when he entered the service of the United States as aforesaid. He received a discharge from his Colonel Waterman, for the nine months service, which discharge is lost or worn out. For the other term of service he was verbally dismissed from service by his Captain. He gives the names of Isaac Gere, Esq, Gilbert Swan, esq, Carlton Morehouse, Jonathan Edgecomb, Ebenezer

Couch and Coddington W Swan, esq to whom he is known in his present neighborhood and who can testify as to his character for veracity and their belief of his service as a soldier of the revolution. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension rolls of any state. Sworn and subscribed to in open court the day and year aforesaid.

APRIL 9, 1833 State of N Y County of Saratoga Personally appeared before me, the undersigned, a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County of Saratoga; TIMOTHY VIBBARD, who, being duly sworn, deposes and saith, that by reason of old age, and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his service, but according to the best of his recollection, he served not less than the Periods mentioned below, and in the following grades:

In 1775-76 for nine months I served as a Private. In 1776 for two months and a half month, I served as a Private. In 1777 for two months I served as a Private; And for such service I claim a pension.

on this 24th day of September 1832 personally appeared before me Henry Lovett, Justice of the Peace of the Town of Glenville, and County of Schenectady aforesaid, Mary Dinning, a resident of the Town of Glenville aforesaid, aged 69 years on the 1st day of May-- last, who being by me first duly sworn according to law, deposes and saith that in the fore part of the Revolutionary war--thinks in the year seventeen hundred and seventy five, she lived in the family of TIMOTHY VIBBARD, whose declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the act of Congress June the 7th-1832 is hereby annexed, that in the spring of the year aforesaid the said TIMOTHY VIBBARD enlisted as a soldier in after his enlistment left home for the campaign, and as was then said for nine months service in said Company & Regiment, and did not return home until after the expiration of nine months, during which time and before and after that time, she lived in the family of the said TIMOTHY VIBBARD as aforesaid, the said TIMOTHY VIBBARD was at several times gone from home for weeks and months at different times, as was then said, in the servid of his country in the war of the revolution, and that she is now and has been well acquainted with the said TIMOTHY VIBBARD ever since the Revolutionary war. **Is|** Mary Dinning Sworn and subscribed to this 24th day of September 1832 before me. **Is|** Henry Lovett (J of P)
